Discipline Data Review



Discipline Infraction Data

- ***School Environmental Safety Incident Reporting*** (SESIR) grew out of the public's concern that children be safe in the school environment. In 1995-96 in response to this concern, the SESIR system was initiated to enable schools to track incidents and analyze patterns of violent, criminal or disruptive activity. The intent is for there to be complete and objective data from which to design interventions to improve the learning environment.
- Aggression
- Campus Disruption (S)
- Fighting (S)
- Physical Attack (S)
- Threat (S)
- Weapons (S)

(S) – indicates SESIR

Discipline Data and Considerations

The data provided is the number and percent of students enrolled at the end of quarter 3 (March), who received at least one discipline referral (for each infraction type) in quarters 1-3 for each respective school year.

Careful attention must be paid to the scales when analyzing the data.

- The scales on each graph are different because there is variation in the percentage of students with each referral type.

Many of the percentages are very small.

- Refer to the number of students table to confirm the magnitude of the change.
- The scales in 4 of the 6 slides are under 1%
- Keep this in mind when you see large increases or decreases.



Discipline Data - Limitations

Limitations:

- In order to provide a percentage, each student can be only counted once for each infraction type. This data does not take into account students with multiple infractions of the same type that occurred in the same school year.
- A discipline infraction is attached to the student. If the student received a referral at "School A" in Quarter one but moves to "School B" in Quarter 2 the infraction is associated with School B.
- Data does not include students that received an infraction in quarter 1-3 but withdrew from the cluster school.
 - An analysis was performed using all discipline referrals and the trend over time remained the same

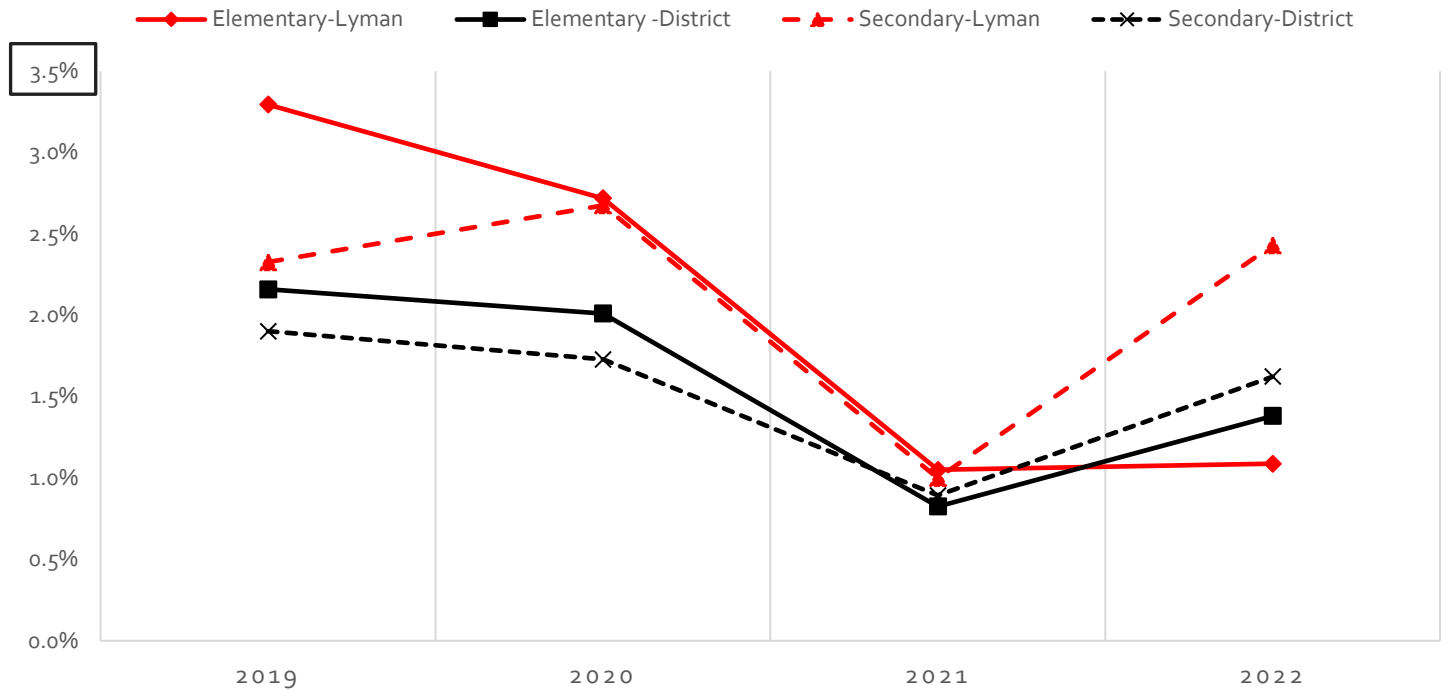


Aggression:

Engaging in any behavior (by word or act) as an individual or as a member of a group or crowd that encourages, incites, or instigates threatening, aggressive, or unsafe acts, or participating as a member of a group or crowd in aggressive or unsafe acts.

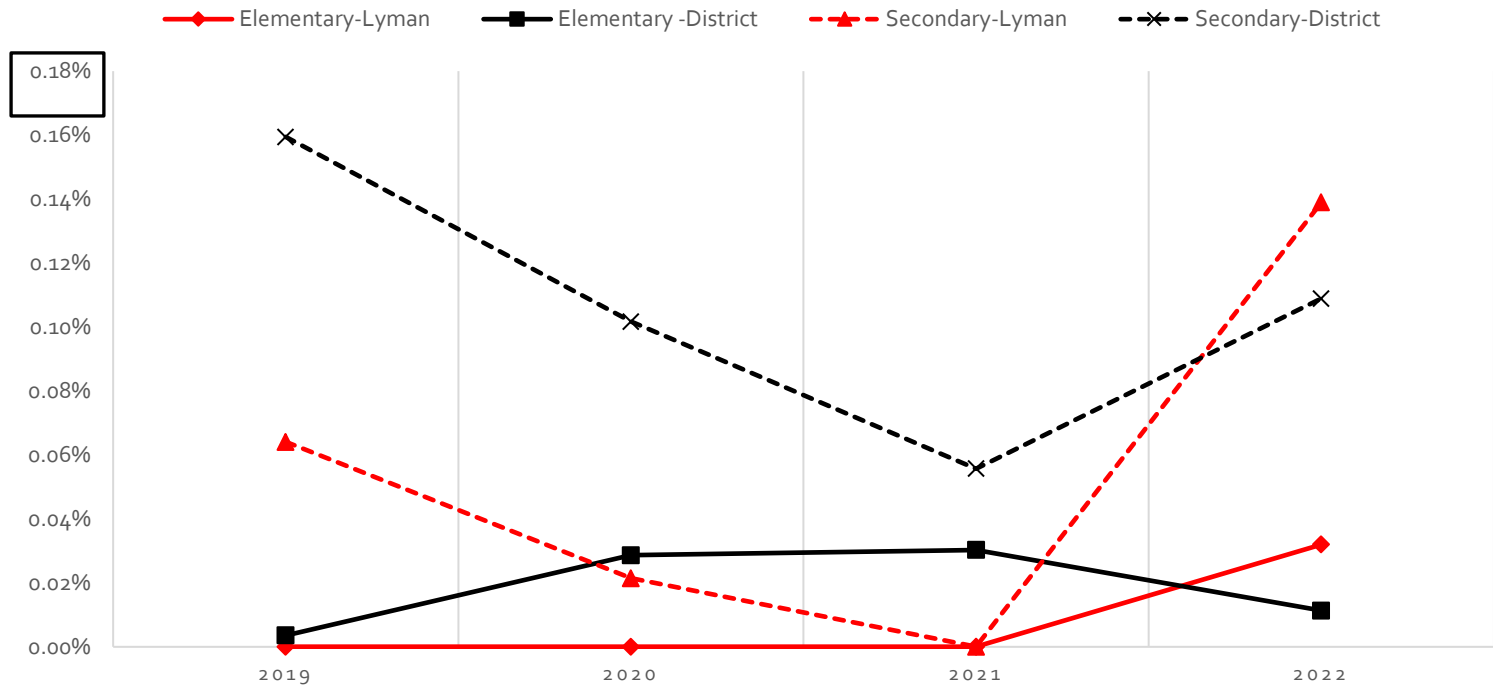

Campus Disruption:

Disruptive behavior that poses a serious threat to the learning environment, health, safety, or welfare of others. Examples of major disruptions include bomb threats, inciting a riot, or initiating a false fire alarm.

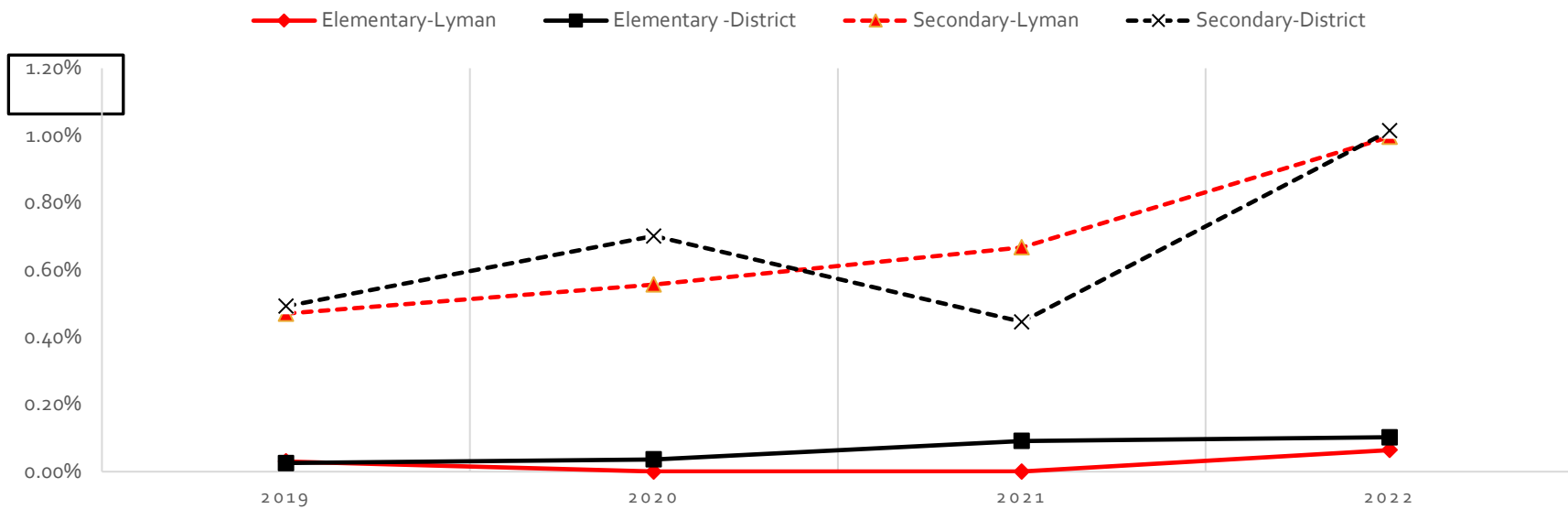


Fighting:

When two or more persons mutually participate in use of force or physical violence that requires either physical intervention or results in injury requiring first aid, or medical attention. Lower-level fights, including pushing, shoving, or altercations that stop on verbal command are not required to be reported in SESIR reporting.

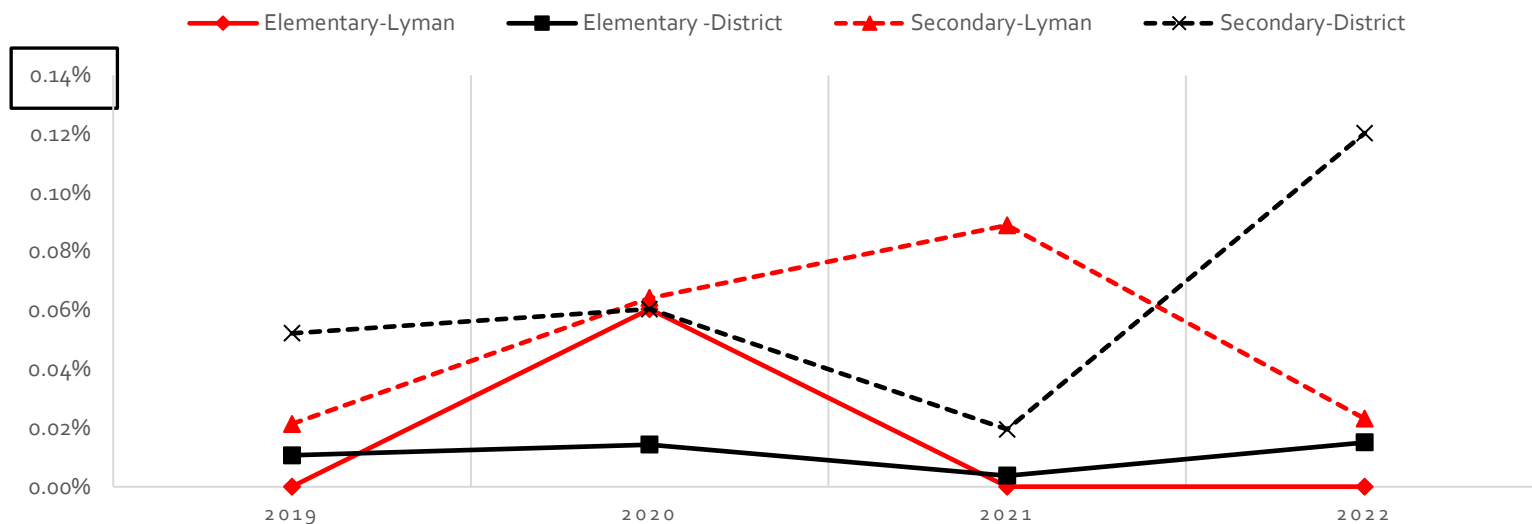


Physical Attack:

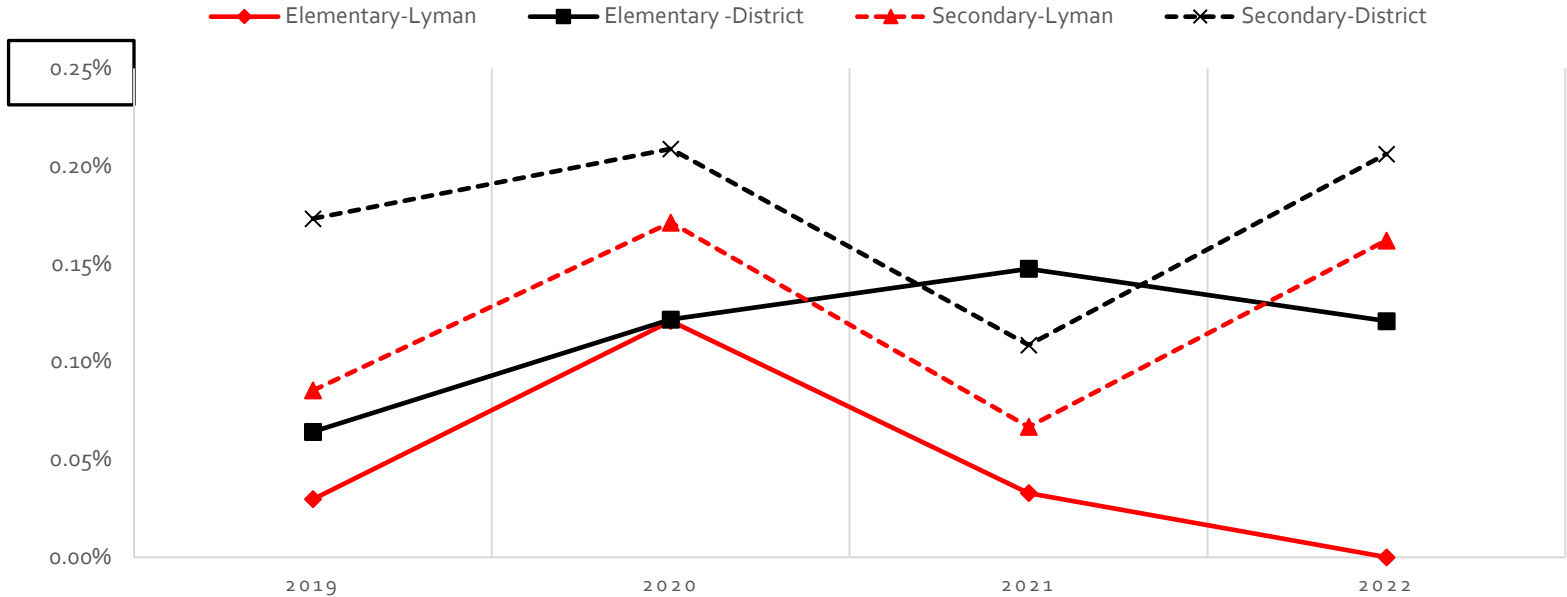


Threat:

An incident where there was no physical contact between the offender and victim, but the victim felt that physical harm could have occurred based on verbal or nonverbal communication by the offender. This includes nonverbal threats and verbal threats of physical harm which are made in person, electronically, or through any other means.

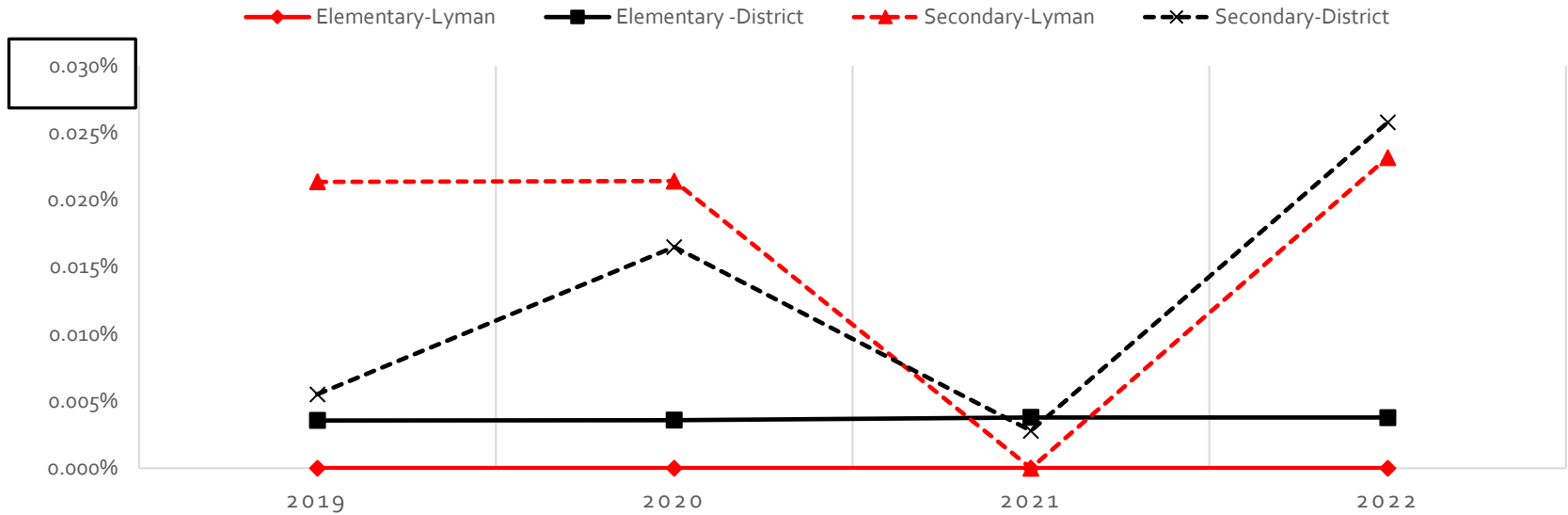


Weapons:

Possession of a firearm or any instrument or object as defined by Section 790.001.F.S., or district code of conduct that can inflict serious harm on another person, or that can place a person in reasonable fear of serious harm. Incidents involving toys and simulated firearms or weapons are subject to the limitations defined in Section 1006.07(2)(g), F.S.

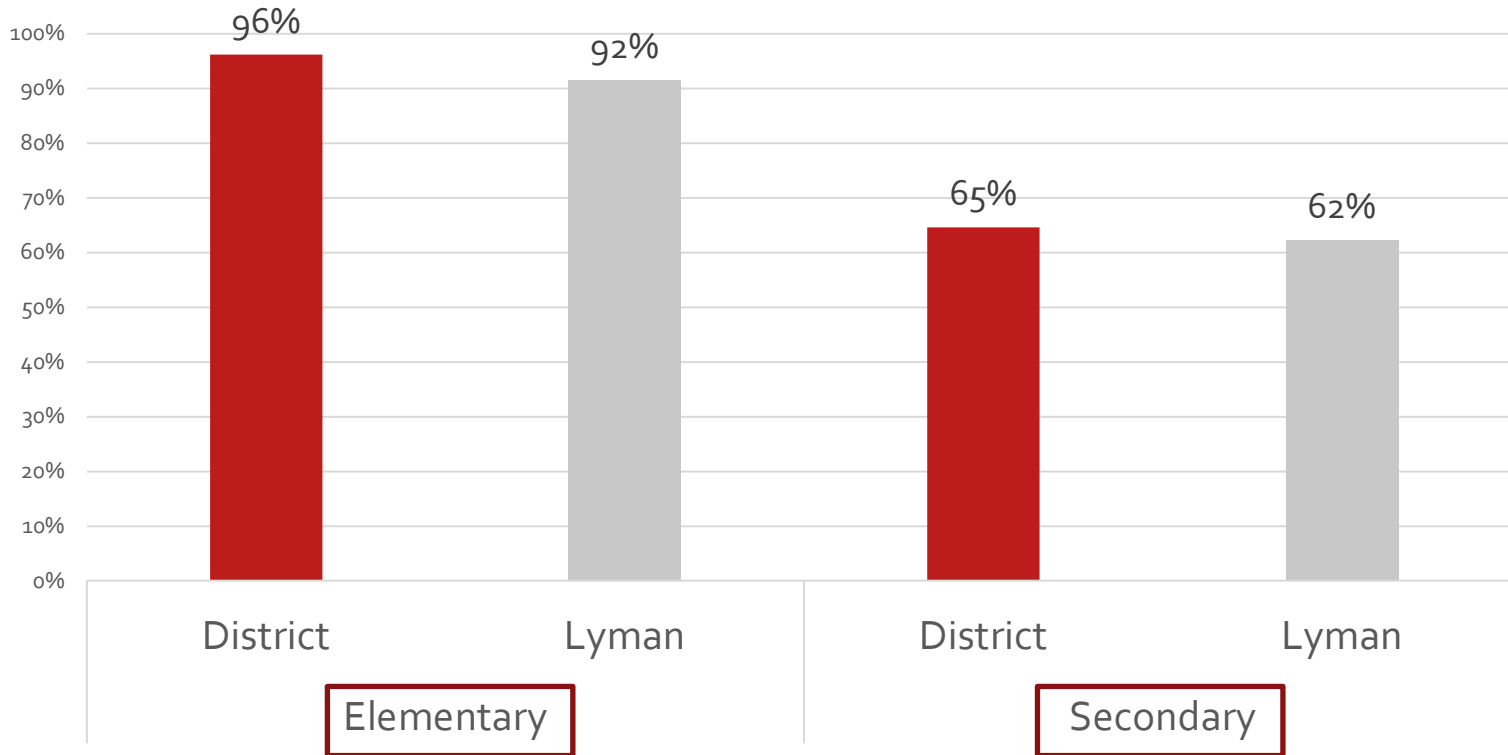

- If you could make changes, what is the one change you would make to the school to make it feel safer?

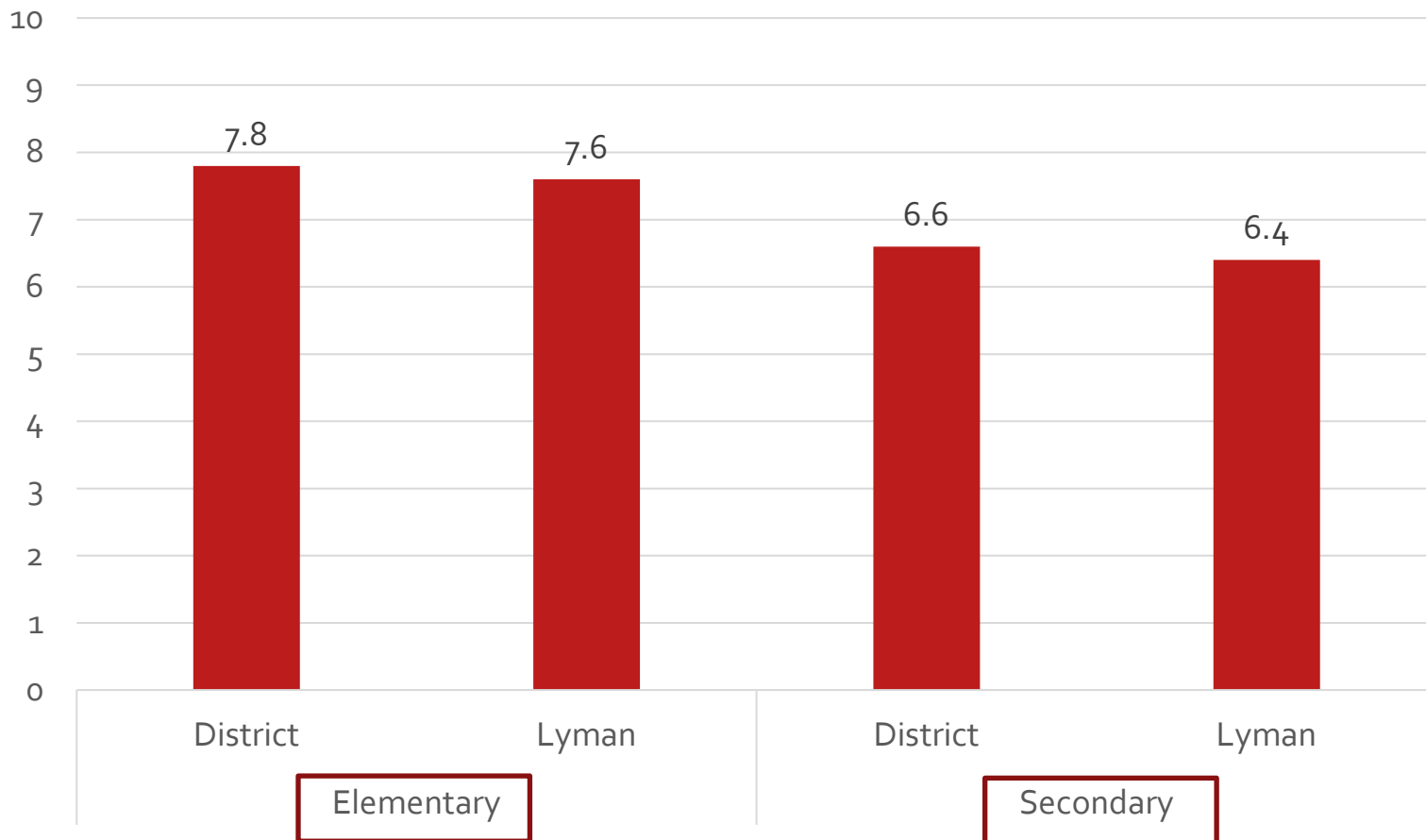

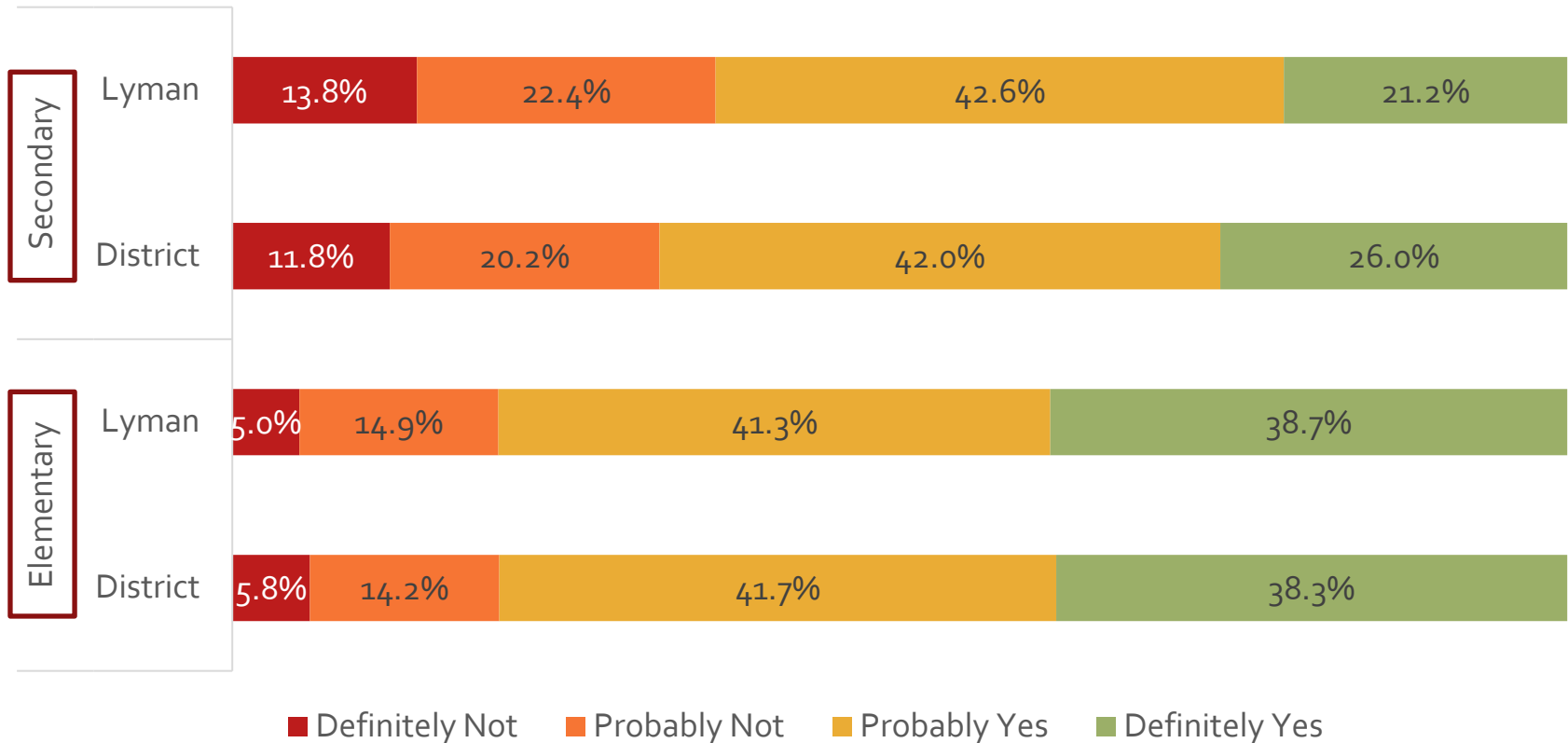

On a scale from 1-10, how safe do you feel at your school?

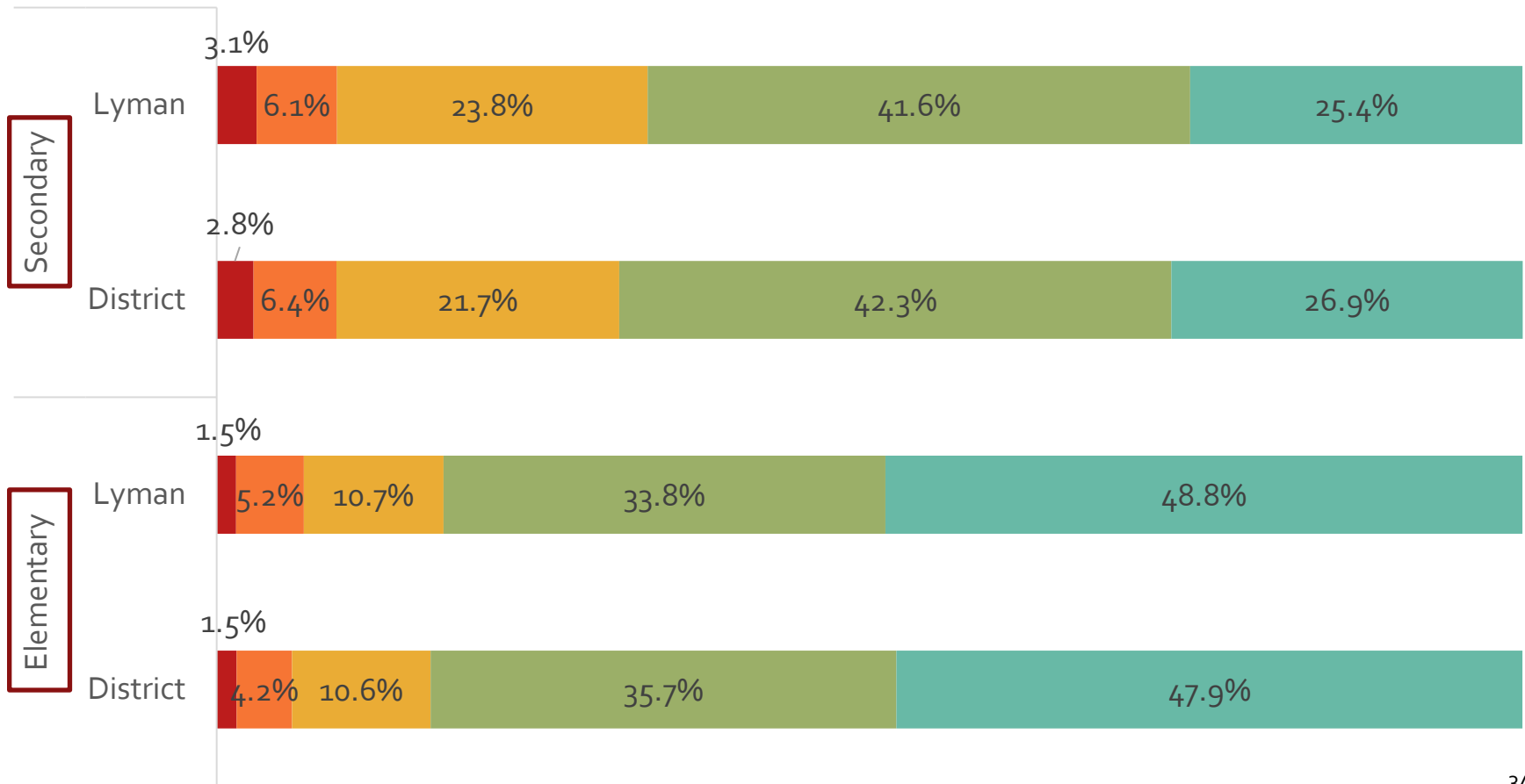




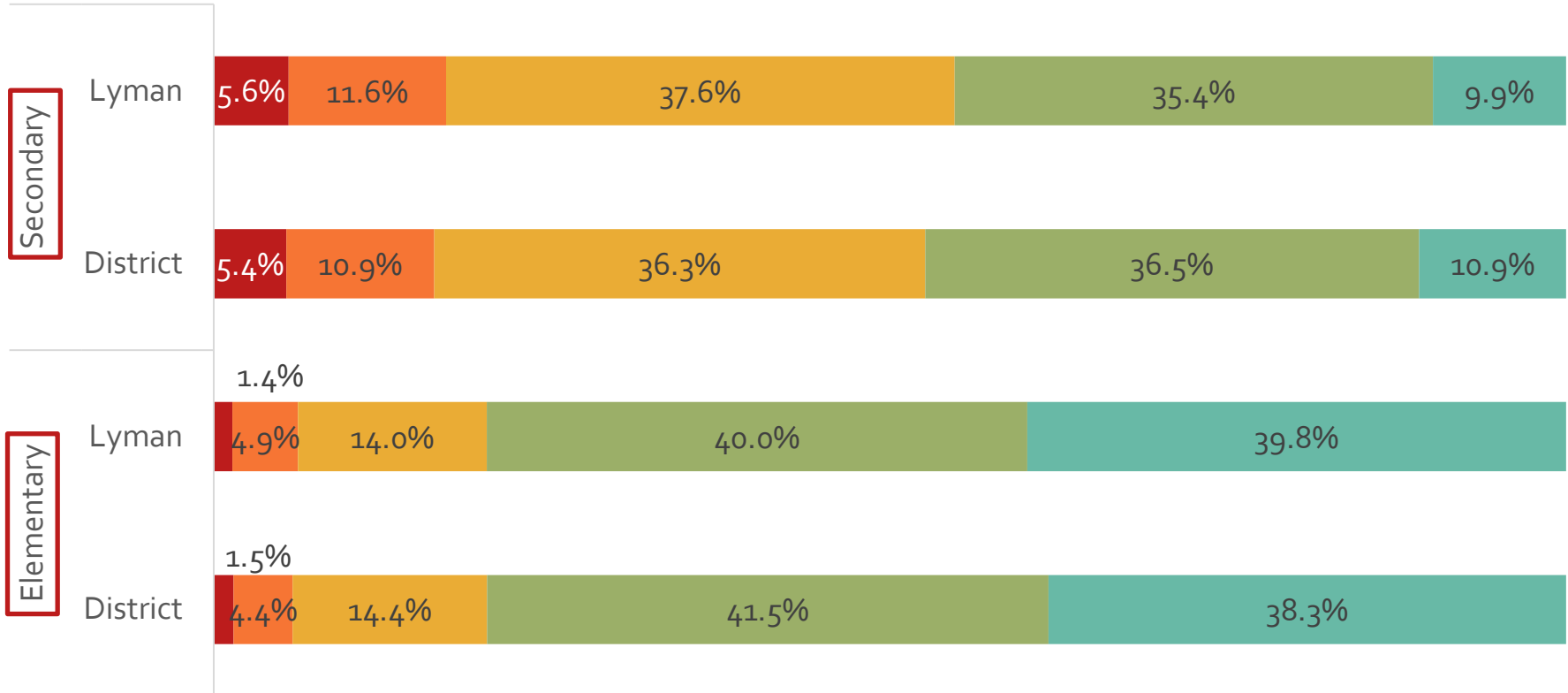
Do you have a trusted adult on campus to talk to if you have a concern?

If you could make changes, what is the one change you would make to the school to make it feel safer?

“I think that I would place more cameras.”

“Have the teachers and staff be more available to speak to, besides the school counselors, in order to get more information on the safety procedures at school.”

“Have a mental health class”

“I feel very safe at my school and can’t think of anything that could make me feel safer than I already do.”

“No one knows what to do in case of emergency during lunch or switching classes. Should go over expectations or plan for what students should do”

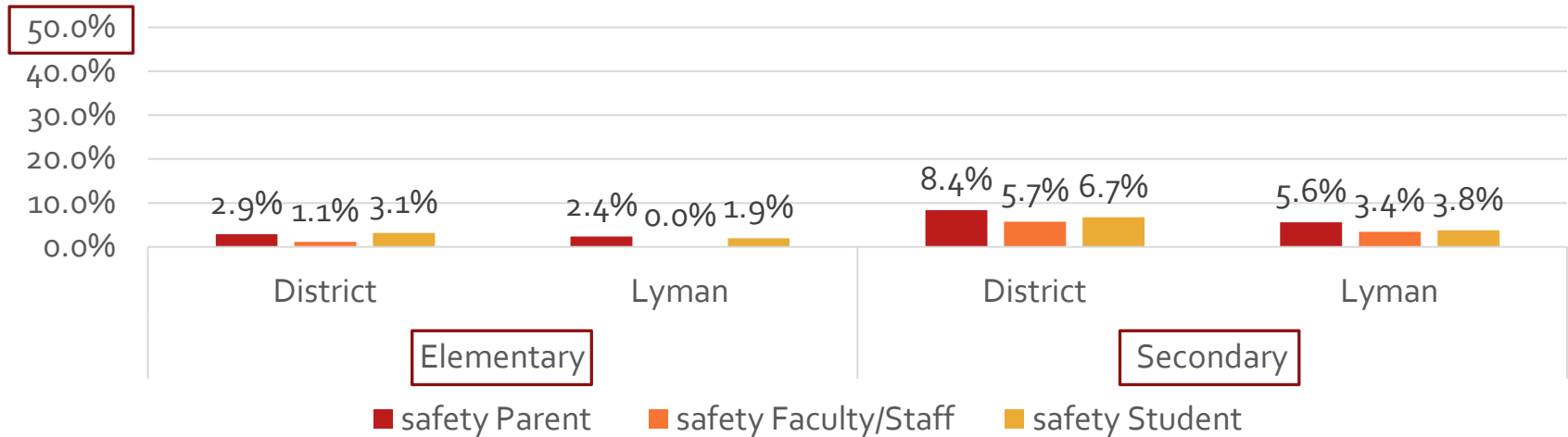

“Communication and safety.” – Secondary Faculty/Staff

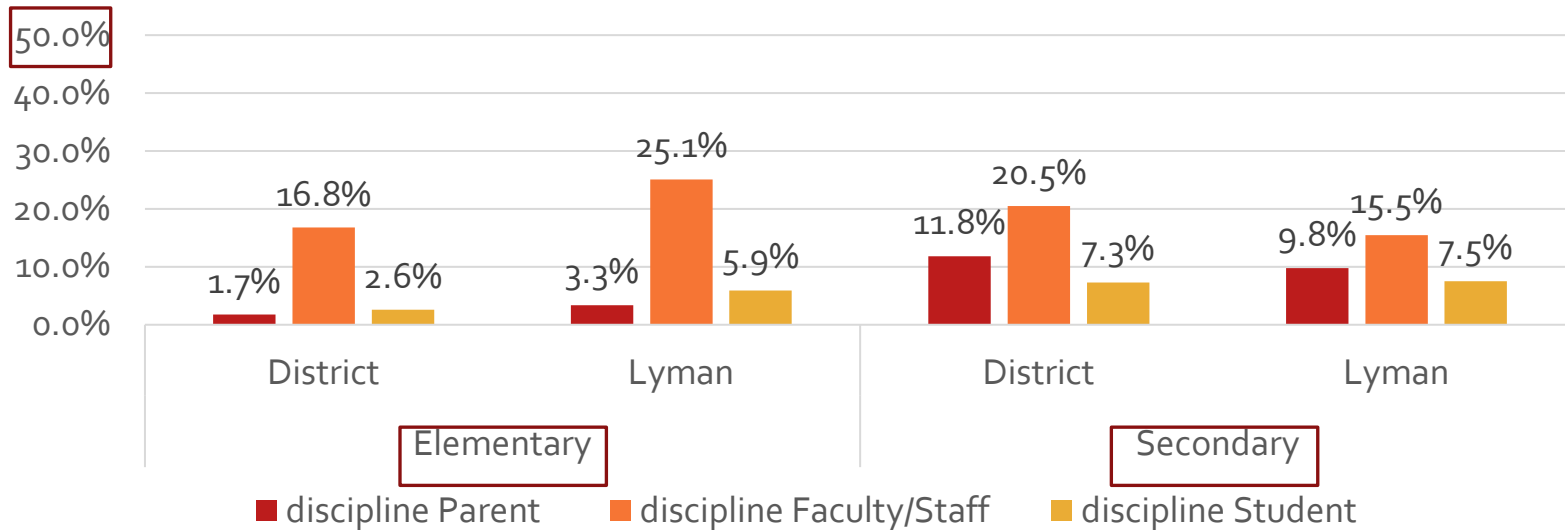
“I think maybe more security for safety and no fights. But overall everything is good.” – Secondary Student

“The school could implement a better safety measure and have more security on staff to avoid fights in the school bathrooms and in the classrooms.” – Secondary Parent

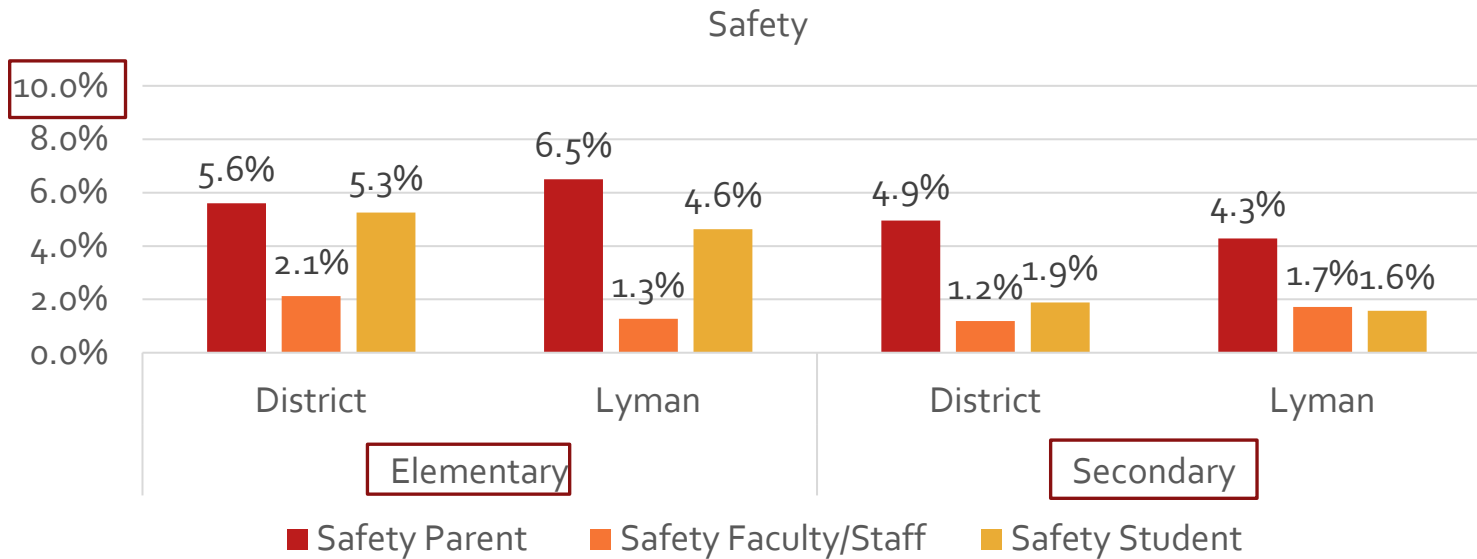
“Institute more behavior monitoring” – Secondary Faculty/Staff

“I like the campus; it's small, it feels safe.” – Elementary Faculty/Staff

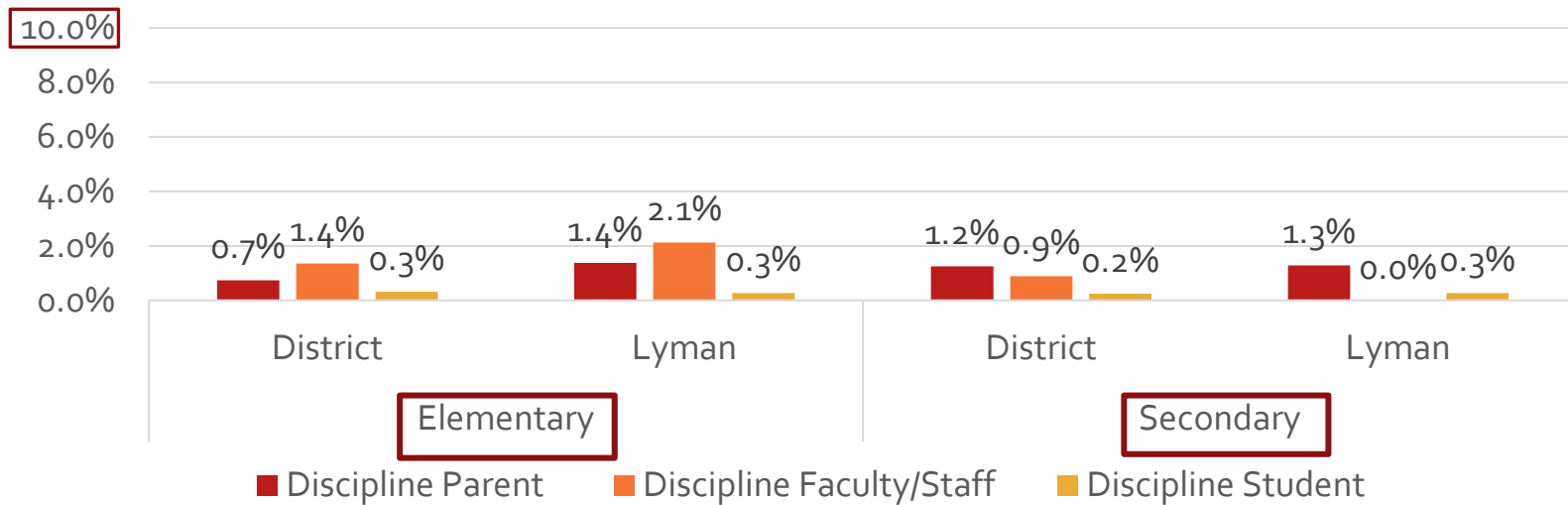
